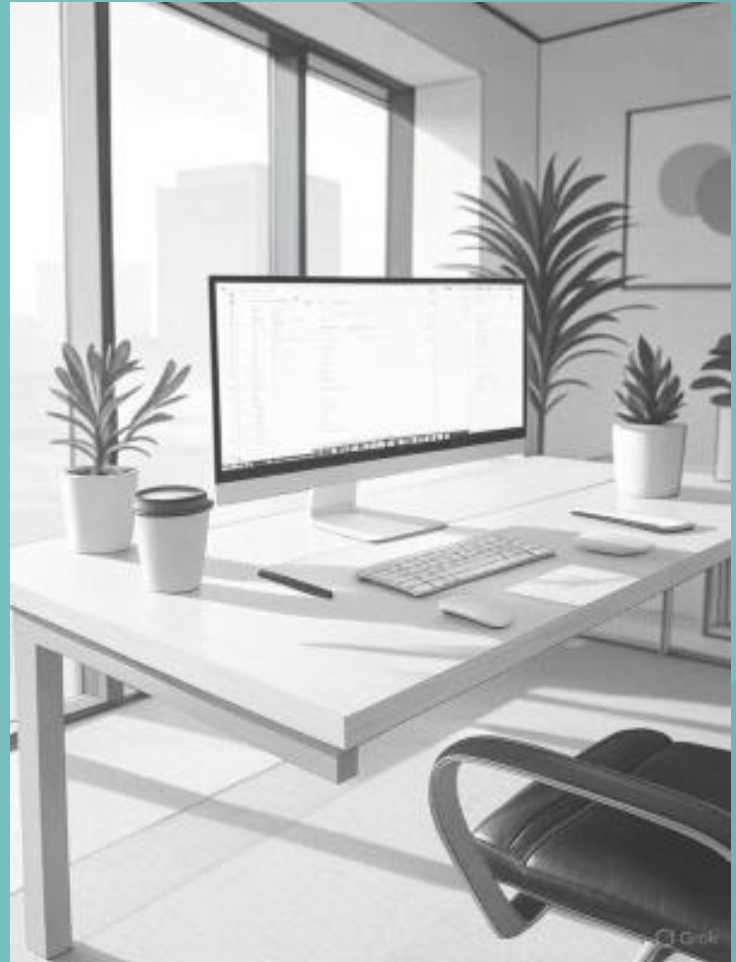

What Makes U.S. Interviews Unique?

Cultural Differences

U.S. job interviews often emphasize self-promotion and clear communication. Employers expect candidates to share achievements directly and confidently.

Example

While modesty is valued in many cultures, U.S. interviewers appreciate when you highlight your strengths with specific examples.

Preparing for Success



Research Company

Understand the company's mission, values, and recent news before the interview.



Practice Answers

Rehearse answers to common questions like 'Tell me about yourself' or 'Why should we hire you?'



Plan Your Look

Choose professional attire that matches the company culture.

Answering Questions Effectively



Use the **STAR method**: Situation, Task, Action, Result.

This helps you organize your answers with real examples.



Focus on **results** and your personal impact.

Share what you learned and how you contributed.

Common U.S. Interview Questions

1



Tell Me About Yourself

Briefly describe your background, skills, and goals.

2



Strengths & Weaknesses

Share strengths confidently and explain how you improve weaknesses.

3



Why This Company?

Explain why you want to work there and how you fit their needs.

Body Language and Communication

Nonverbal Cues

- Make eye contact to show confidence
- Offer a firm handshake
- Sit up straight and avoid crossing your arms

Communication Style

Speak clearly and avoid slang. It's okay to pause and think before answering.



Follow-Up Etiquette

After the Interview

Send a thank-you email within 24 hours.
Mention something specific from the interview
and express your interest in the position.
