Tags as Politeness Tools

Why Use Tags?

- Tags make statements **softer** and more polite.
- They invite agreement, instead of sounding bossy.

Example:

- Direct: Close the window.
- Softer: Close the window, will you?
- Polite: It's cold today, isn't it?

Tip: In English, tags often replace 'please' for natural politeness.



English vs Spanish Tags



Spanish often uses **por favor** or intonation for politeness.

Cierra la ventana, por favor.

English uses the **tag** itself to sound polite.
Close the window, will you?

Tags Start Conversations

Making Small Talk

Tags invite the listener to join in, making the conversation warmer.

Examples:

- You like football, don't you?
- You've been to Cancún, haven't you?
- This food is delicious, isn't it?

Contrast: Spanish often starts with a direct question. English tags feel less direct and more welcoming.



Top 5 Common Mistakes

1

Overusing 'isn't it'

Many learners use 'isn't it' for every tag. Use the correct auxiliary.

2

Not Flipping Polarity

Learners forget to switch from positive to negative or vice versa in the tag.

3

Double Negatives

Using two negatives in the tag and statement is incorrect in English.

4

Wrong Pronoun

Using 'he' instead of 'they' with words like 'everyone' is a common error.



Real-World Application

Why Tags Matter

- Using tag questions correctly can instantly make you sound more fluent.
- Native speakers notice errors with tags right away.
- Mastering tags helps you blend in and connect in English-speaking environments.

Begin small talk with a tag to invite discussion.

Daily Drills

Turn Spanish sentences into English tags every day.

Ongoing

Error Correction

Identifying Common Tag Question Mistakes



Answer 1:

Tag questions make statements softer, invite agreement, and often replace 'please' for natural politeness.

Answer 2:

Two common mistakes are overusing 'isn't it' and not flipping polarity.

Answer 3:

Tags invite the listener to join in the conversation, making it warmer and less direct than a standard question.
